CAROLINA CASTALDI

Professor and Chair in Geography of Innovation, Utrecht University.

Carolina's research deals with processes of innovation and how they unfold over time and over space. Her goal is to develop a broad account of innovation, as including both technological and non-technological forms. As such, she has investigated extensively how innovation emerges in service and creative sectors and the changing business models through which companies operate in local and global markets. Her most recent research aims at understanding how firm-level innovation drives regional development and the resilience of places. Her original contribution to research on geography of innovation also includes the development of novel indicators of innovation, exploiting patent and trademark data. Carolina Castaldi is Editor at Industrial and Corporate Change and member of the Board of EPIP (European Policy for Intellectual Property).



Wednesday, 10 January 9:15 - 10:45 GMT in Theatre B, University Place Keynote title: Mapping Innovation



JAMES BESSEN

Executive Director of the Technology & Policy Research Initiative at Boston University.

An economist and technologist, James Bessen has also been a successful innovator and CEO of a software company. He studies the major economic impacts of technology on society (see New York Times profile), writing academic papers, magazine articles, and books. His latest book, The New Goliaths (Yale 2022), argues that major firms' investments in proprietary software systems have allowed them to increase their dominance of industries, slowing aggregate innovation and raising income inequality. Earlier work with Michael Meurer on patents identified the social costs of poorly defined property rights (see Patent Failure, Princeton 2008), including the first evidence of damage from patent trolls. Bessen's work on automation (see Learning by Doing, Yale 2015), both historical and current, provides a distinct analysis of effects on employment, skills, and wage inequality. Bessen's work has been widely cited in the press as well as by the US White House and Supreme Court, the European Parliament, and the Federal Trade Commission.

CHRISTIAN BINZ

Christian is a research group leader at the Department of Environmental Social Sciences (ESS) at the Swiss Federal Institute of Aquatic Science & Technology (Eawag), an Associate Fellow at the Centre for Innovation Research (CIRCLE), Lund University, Sweden, and a guest lecturer at the Department of Geography (GIUZ) at the University of Zurich, Switzerland.

His main research interests are centered on the geographies of innovation and sustainability transitions, the globalization of clean-tech innovation, as well as green industrial path development and leapfrogging dynamics in middle-income countries like China and India. By combining recent insights from transition studies, economic geography and institutional sociology, he aims to explore how multi-scalar actor networks and institutional arrangements influence the development and diffusion of clean-tech industries and sustainability transitions in key infrastructure sectors like energy, water, or transport. His work has been published in leading journals of innovation studies, economic geography and sustainability transition studies and he is managing a thematic group within the sustainability transitions research network (STRN) on the geography of sustainability transitions.

VALENTINA DE MARCHI

Associate Professor at the Department of Society, Politics and Sustainability at ESADE Business School.

Valentina's research deals with processes of innovations aiming at reducing environmental impacts, especially in contexts of global value chains, when production is fragmented along geographically dispersed actors. As such, her research deals with the complexity to develop environmental innovations, investigating how firms can address this complexity. Her more recent research aims at understanding the role of paradoxical approach to support achieving sustainability results, and the interplay of environmental upgrading and downgrading at different tiers of value chains.

DAVIDE CONSOLI

Davide Consoli is Senior Research Fellow at INGENIO (CSIC-UPV) in Valencia, Spain. He was previously at the University of Manchester, UK.

and effects of innovation and new technology, with a particular emphasis on the dynamics of skill emergence and obsolescence; on structural changes in employment; and on distributional outcomes. His published work focuses on a variety of empirical contexts such as customer banking, medicine, Knowledge Intensive Business Services and, more recently, the green transition. He has led and co-led grants funded by the EC, ESRC, Leverhulme Foundation (UK) and the Ministry of Science and Innovation (ES). He has also advised the NHS, DTI (UK), CSI (IT), EC JRC and Eurofound. He is a member of the advisory editorial board of Research Policy and, previously, of Technology Analysis and Strategic Management. He has been invited to give keynote talks and participate in expert panels by the EC, the Young Foundation (UK), the US Science Foundation, ANECA (ES) and GSSI (IT).

ERIKA KRAEMER-MBULA

Erika Kraemer-Mbula is a Professor of Economics and is currently the Chair holder of the DSI/NRF/Newton Fund Trilateral Chair in Transformative Innovation, the Fourth Industrial Revolution and Sustainable Development, based at the College of Business and Economics (University of Johannesburg) and in partnership with ACTS and SPRU.

Her work focuses on alternative development paths for African economies. She specialises in the analysis of innovation systems in connection to equitable development and inclusive development, and has done pioneering work on innovation in the African informal sector. Erika has undertaken a range of advisory assignments with international institutions (such as IDRC, TWAS, UNIDO, UNESCO, UNICEF, among others). Her experience in this area includes the evaluation of strategic innovation-related programmes of international donor organisations, designing and reviewing regional and national STI policies, as well as supporting the implementation of innovation strategies in African countries.

Distance from nearest railway/Metrolink to the University

- Manchester Oxford Road railway station: 0.4 miles.
- Manchester Piccadilly railway station/Metrolink stop: 0.8 miles.
- Peter's Square Metrolink stop: 0.7 miles.

From Manchester Airport to the City Centre

By Train: The train route (to Oxford Road Station or Manchester Piccadilly Station) takes between 18-21 minutes, they run every 10 minutes via the operators TransPennine Express or Northern Rail. There is also a much slower Metrolink (tram) service to the city but we advise you to take the train!

By Taxi: This journey takes around 20 minutes without traffic. No advanced booking is required. £25-£35 depending on time and traffic. A taxi rank for Black Cabs is located outside each terminal. You may also request a pickup from a private hire service such as <u>Street Cars</u>, <u>Uber</u> or <u>Bolt</u>.

By Bus: Take <u>Route 43</u> from Manchester Airport Bus Station to Piccadilly Gardens, passing through Oxford Road University Shopping Centre (Stop C). The journey takes 35-45 minutes with multiple stops, but is the most economical option.
